From the Candidate

I have been a member of NAPNAP since 1992 and a PNP since 1993. I earned my BSN from Oregon Health Sciences University (OHSU) in 1994, a MSN in Childrearing Nursing from OHSU in 1989 and a post-masters PNP Certificate in 1993 from OHSU. In 2008, I earned a PhD in Nursing from University of Colorado College of Nursing in Denver. I am a Fellow in the American Association of Nurse Practitioners.

During my 25 years practicing as a PNP, I have worked in primary care, urgent care and school-based health care. I currently practice in Pediatric Urgent Care at Woodcreek Mary Bridge in Puyallup, Washington. Many of my patients are poor or underserved, and in spite of the Affordable Care Act they still do not get the comprehensive care they need. I see pediatric healthcare providers as a critical piece in meeting the needs of children for a safe, healthy childhood. I am also a nurse educator. I have taught both undergraduate and graduate students, focusing on pediatric care, pharmacology, and quality and safety. I have mentored many former students to become pediatric nurses and PNP's.

I am a nationally recognized expert in pediatric pharmacology and NP prescribing who has presented twelve times at the NAPNAP national conferences in the past 10 years, plus 16 all day pediatric pharmacology workshops for NAPNAP across the US. I am lead author on *Pharmacotherapeutics for Advanced Practice Prescribers*, a textbook used by 260 nurse practitioner programs in the US, with the fifth edition to be published in 2019. I have served in the Pediatric Nursing Certification Board (PNCB) Pharmacology Pediatric Updates Committee since 2002.

In 2016 I represented NAPNAP on the Centers for Disease Control/Pew Charitable Trust Antibiotic Stewardship in Outpatient Settings: A Focus on Retail Clinics and Urgent Care Facilities committee and in 2015 the CDC/Pew Outpatient Antibiotic Prescribing: Setting a National Goal for Inappropriate Use committee, the only nurse practitioner on each of these committees.

As a member-at-large, I will bring all of my broad experiences to serve as a board representative for chapters, SIGs and committees, as well as a resource when issues arise that require assistance at the national level. I will be honored to serve on the NAPNAP board, to serve NAPNAP members and to promote child health.
